
THE KOTO COVID CONTINUITY FUND (KCCF)



What is it?

The KOTO Covid Continuity Fund (KCCF) is a fundraising campaign that aims to keep KOTO running at full steam for the duration of the pandemic and until borders reopen. Initially we are aiming to raise \$14,000 to cover the ongoing costs of feeding, housing, and clothing our trainees.

Why is this happening?

Covid has hit the development sector hard and KOTO particularly hard. A huge part of our income came from our restaurant near Hanoi's Temple of Literature. Unfortunately this relied heavily on Hanoi's tourist trade which has taken a significant hit. We've changed location but setting up a new restaurant is a challenge and we're still finding our feet.

Who's involved?

The more the merrier - we'll be running the campaign but we'll be calling on the assistance of our business partners, donors, current and former volunteers, alumni, staff and anyone and everyone else that has ever been touched by KOTO.



Where is it happening?

The biggest problem for our business activities is the closure of international borders. In lieu of visitors being able to visit Vietnam we're reaching out across the ether. That said, if you're based in Vietnam we'll be running a series of events at our Tay Ho restaurant.



When does it start?

We're always accepting donations whatever the size and right now is most definitely no exception. That said, we'll be running this campaign until borders reopen which could be anywhere from six months to one year away.
